## Kauri 6 to 9 Learning Community Morning Programme

#### **Three-Hour Work Cycle**

In the 6 -13 classrooms the children's Work Cycle begins at 8:30 AM, when school starts for the day.

As well as a **continuation** of the **work cycle** on some afternoons, each class focus will be:

## Kauri (6-9) Afternoon Programme

#### Monday:

- Spelling and Whole Language Focus and Reading Groups
- Could the children please bring their reading folders and spelling books each Monday, when they will be offered new reading books and spelling words for the week.
- Shared Story Read Aloud

### Tuesday:

• **Art Focus**, The children will continue working with clay this term and they will also begin a focus on weaving.

#### Wednesday:

- Buddy Reading
- Singing with Paula

"In Kauri, we (6 to 9) will be learning new songs, singing some old favourites, using percussion and rhythm instruments and incorporating movement with most of our songs."

#### Thursday:

- Creative Writing for Author's Chair, and Research Focus
- Permaculture Gardening

We have a new gardening teacher, Magenta, who will be working with the children in the gardens every Thursday afternoon. We say goodbye and thank you to Lily, who has been with Nova for many years. Lily is now working fulltime and is unable to continue with us.

#### Friday:

- **Gymnastics** has begun at the Christchurch School of Gymnastics (Term 2 and 3) as of Friday 24<sup>th</sup> April. And every other Friday afternoon, except swim week.
- Gymnastics is offered to all primary children and the Children's House 5 year old children.
- The bus will collect the children and teachers from Nova at 1:30 and the gym session will be from 1:45 to 2:45 returning to Nova by 3:pm
- Nova sports tops (variety of sizes) available from the school office at a cost of \$35.00. These tops are of an excellent quality, comfortable, smart and a great way to see our Nova children on the gym floor. When children have a sport top they put on the gym/sport persona.

# **Early Maori** and their **Migration from Polynesia** (Following on from our study of early humans in Term 1)

"Today those things that occupy us in the field of education; are the interests of humanity at large and of civilization. Before such great forces we can recognize only one country—the entire world."

At six years old there is a great transformation in the child, like a new birth. The child wants to explore society and the world, to learn what is right and wrong, to think about meaningful roles in society. She wants to know how everything came to be, the history of the universe, the world, humans and why they behave the way they do. He asks the BIG questions and wants answers. These children explore manners (and bad manners!); they are interested in religion and what it means to people in different cultures. It is the time to use the mind to explore all areas of knowledge, to begin to conduct research, and to develop creative ways of processing, exploring, and expressing this knowledge.

**Botany:** Individual exploration and lessons.

**Friday: Technicraft (**Friday afternoon for Y7 and Y8 students) will continue at Christchurch East School and **Gymnastics** and **Trampolining** for all other Pohutukawa children.

# Cosmic Education in Pohutukawa Room Continuation of Bridges:

In term one we learned all about beam, truss, suspension and cable-stayed bridges and the geometry that works best for each.

We learned about reasons bridges fail and viewed pictures and clips of bridge catastrophes.

We also viewed some amazing modern examples that use hybrids of many types of designs. The students had opportunities to experiment with making examples of all of these types of bridges. We used wooden blocks, Kinex, and cardboard to make different beam bridges and then made them stronger by adding box girders. We also made truss bridges out of newspaper and we were very surprised about how strong they were!

We also made suspension bridges using chairs from our classroom and tested their strength and wind resistance.

This term we will continue with our bridge studies by exploring moving bridges and continue to create our own using popsicle sticks. The bridge exploration will finish off with a tour of local bridges with an engineer!

Principles of the Prepared Environment: How the Prepared Environment Supports Cosmic Education, Wellington, June 2015

This workshop will explore the details of the psychological and physical prepared environment for the elementary (6-12) child.

In addition to the theoretical aspects of Cosmic Education and the characteristics of the child, teachers will also address how to encourage and inspire meaningful work including how to generate interest, inspire follow up work, and increase the variety of work in the 6-12 classroom without using imposed assignments or teacher directed activities.

Teachers will be provided with practical advice on the organization and maintenance of their classroom as well as working with parents, administrators, and staff.

Teachers will come away refreshed and their spirits energized. They will have ideas for improving their work while remaining calm and focused on the essential priorities of a Montessori classroom. This workshop is suitable for primary teachers in Montessori 6-12 classes.
